Narrative description of the Prop 28 art education program(s) funded.

Bullis Charter School allocated Prop 28 funds in their entirety to support the salary of our dedicated elementary music teacher at our North Campus. This investment made it possible to sustain a structured, sequential music education program for all students in grades TK through 5, reaching approximately 270 students with regular classroom instruction throughout the school year. Beyond core music classes, Prop 28 funding also supported participation by approximately 80 students from both campuses, including students from special populations, in an expanded co-and extra-curricular arts program. These students engaged in choir and participated in a full calendar of performances: a fall concert, spring concert, fall theatre performance, spring theatre performance, and both a middle school musical and a spring musical.

The impact of this investment was meaningful and broad. Students developed musical literacy, vocal skills, performance confidence, and the ability to collaborate as an ensemble. For students in special populations, the choir and theatre program offered a particularly important avenue for belonging, creative expression, and social connection. Prop 28 funding allowed Bullis Charter School to treat music not as an add-on, but as a core part of the student experience, in direct alignment with the intent of the Arts and Music in Schools Funding Guarantee and Accountability Act (Ed. Code § 8820 et seq.).
